


## The Veterinary Kaleidoscope Summit

What are some concrete things we can do on an individual level so our minds and bodies can continue to support us as we fight the good fight, or is stress really going to kill us?

1.30pm	Strategic Inefficiency - it's not you, the system really IS broken Alex Harrison, Kate Toyer Strategic inefficiency is how systems and organisations resist change stopping people from getting the things they need in order to thrive. This session will help you recognise strategic efficiency and develop strategies to work around it.		
2.00pm	<b>Direct Action - Petitions to Protests. Dismantling institutional bureaucracy</b> Alex Harrison, Kate Toyer		
	There are times when you need to recognise that you can't work with the system. Learn strategies to force the system to firstly acknowledge that change has to happen and then make that change happen.		
2.30pm	Conflicting Needs: When universal design is not so universal. Jodie Wilson, Alex Harrison The principals of universal design tell us that with the right approach, solving a problem for one person should benefit everyone. Is this true? What happens when one person's accommodations directly conflict with the accommodations required by another person in the same workplace? Can we really "solve for all"?

3.30pm	Diversifying Veterinary Student Recruitment - a catalyst for transforming our veterinary profession. Suff Suharju Join us for a dynamic discussion on diversifying our veterinary student population. Hear firsthand how inclusive strategies spark real change, challenge the status quo and generate wins for the profession.

Channy McGowan, Caitlin Pfeiffer  Considering other people is a good thing but making accommodations without consultation can be ineffective or even negative. Do we know what students need? Have we asked our colleagues? Do we have the right people in the right roles in our practices?		
4.30pm	Kaleidoscope Voices Part Two Kate Toyer, Jodie Wilson  Join us for a moderated discussion as we open the floor for attendees who wish to share their lived experience of accessible and inclusive wins with the rest of our Kaleidoscope community.
